Subject Choice in the Sacred Heart School

Choosing subjects at both junior and senior cycle is one of the most important features of your daughter's education. At the Sacred Heart School we promote the widest possible choice, where students are actively encouraged to test and taste and only then make their choice.

In the new Junior Cycle Programme in the Sacred Heart School students will chose ten subjects for their Junior Cycle Programme. However they will have a Taster Programme in 1st year. This means that all 1st year students will try all subjects and then select their ten subjects in May of 1st year. This model has worked particularly well for students in that it allows them select on the basis of experience. This model is also supported by the Department of Education and Skills and is advised by all educational bodies as best practice.

Leaving Certificate Applied

For students who do not wish to go the traditional route, the Sacred Heart School provides an alternative programme. The LCA Programme allows students to complete their Leaving Certificate programme through a continuous assessment programme.

Traditionally, the students who complete LCA will then work towards a PLC course.

Career Guidance

At both junior and senior cycle we have a comprehensive Career Guidance Programme.

At junior cycle, students are encouraged to reflect on not only what they would like to be, but also who they would like to be.

Positivity and opportunity are key features of this programme and we use our aptitude tests not to determine a students' ability but rather to measure growth and measure improvement. We focus on how our students are transitioning to 1sy year, advising practical study skills and focussing on management skills

At senior cycle students have individual and class meeting with our Guidance Counsellor and students are encouraged and supported as they advance towards their career choice.

Students in the Sacred Heart School are encourage to manage their learning and choices.

Transition Year Programme

In fourth year all students are given the opportunity to participate in Transition Year. At present we have approximately 93 students in TY.

Among all education bodies, it is agreed that students who participate in TY are more prepared for the demands of fifth year. Students who participate in TY have developed their social skills, have the advantage of work experience and of working in a very different learning environment.

In the 21st century workplace it is essential that our daughters can collaborate with teams and share both information and experience.

The Transition Year Programme is a demanding year and engagement and commitment are emphasised to all participants.

Why an All Girls School?

- Leadership roles are held by girl thus giving strength to the notion that girls are natural leaders.

S.H.S Choir

The S.H.S. Choir have toured Germany, Austria Italy, Czechoslovakia and the United Kingdom.

In 2012 the S.H.S. Choir was one of four choirs to compete in the live televised final of the All Island School Choir competition in the Titanic Quarter in Belfast.

They performed with groups such as the Band of an Garda Siochana, Vienna Boys Choir and the Celtic Tenors.

They were prize winners of the RTE Lyric FM 'Choirs for Christmas' competition.

The Choir have performed many times in the National Concert Hall along with many radio and television performances.

Why Mixed Ability?

SHS - A Digital Hub

- In 2016 the Sacred Heart School introduced a Linx tablet as a teaching and learning tool.
- It had a marked impact on organisation, bag size and student learning and has been one of the most successful innovations in our school.
- All students use Office 365 and One Note and the potential to store, share and engage has meant that students are very involved in their learning process. This is a key component of the new Junior Cycle.
- The use of email and Edmodo means that students can access all materials now, no matter where they are.
- An Information Night on the Linx tablet will be held for parents in February 2018.



Junk Kouture

Bank of Ireland Junk Kouture is a national contest which encourages young designers in second level education to create striking couture designs and impressive works of wearable art from everyday junk that would normally find its way into the bin.
